COURSE PLAN - HEALTH PROMOTION MAJOR

Area of Emphasis : Health Promotion

This area of emphasis prepares students for health promotion and wellness positions in public, community, worksite, and health care settings, as well as for graduate level work in public health. Pre-nursing and preoccupational therapy students will typically choose this emphasis as well as students who wish to pursue a Masters in Public Health or a Masters in Healthcare Administration.

This is a high demand major. Students typically apply to the major (fall or spring) in their sophomore year and begin major sequence classes the following semester. After admission, there are four semesters of sequenced courses culminating in a 300-hour internship. -Information on HPRB 5560S - Field Experience in HPB (internship)

- The field experience will be completed (during one semester for 6 credit hours) no earlier than the student's final semester of study for the degree. • Prior to HPRB 5560S enrollment
- Students must submit their internship proposal documents by mid-point of the semester preceding the internship.
 - First Aid and CPR certification is a required part of the internship proposal and will not be evaluated until senior year.
- Students must complete all University requirements (including PEDB).
- Students must complete all major-required courses with a C or better.
 - Maximum hours during the last semester are restricted to 6 hours of electives and 6 hours of internship.

-Important: Additional undergraduate classes may be needed for students pursuing pre-professional pathways (i.e. pre-med, pre-PA, pre-dental, prelaw, etc.). It is important that students review the admission criteria of their intended graduate professional program well in advance.

Students are advised to meet with their intended graduate pre-professional advisor to ensure they are meeting all graduate application requirements. as well as reviewing their graduate application strategy and timeline.
